## 4.3.1. Formation of National Facilitating Committee (NFC)

This activity was completed within a prior reporting period.

## 4.3.2. 6-monthly meeting of NFC

A meeting of the NFC was convened on 29<sup>th</sup> March 2016. As the previous meeting was in December 2015, the bi-annual meeting was not due until June 2016, however the chair for the NFC andCMS dugong focal point Mt Trinison Tari felt during the early stages of this project's implementation more frequent meetings would be useful.

Christina Shaw (VESS) gave a report on the activities that had taken place for the VU1 project. Some discussions were had and suggestions made on the various aspects of implementing the VU1 project activities as described in the minutes (attached).

In addition to the Scheduled NFC meeting, Jerry Spooner of the Department of Tourism (DoT) requested a meeting to discuss dugong and turtles in tourism. DoT are implementing a new policy to ensure all tourism operators in Vanuatu adhere to a minimum standard. DoT requested input on what should be included in the minimum standards regarding wildlife including dugongs and turtles. They also asked for advice on responding to reports of turtles and dugongs being kept in captivity for tourism. The need for It was decided at the meeting that the next steps are to engage the relevant government departments at a Director level and invite them to the next NFC meeting followed by a workshop to discuss these issues with all stakeholders and that SPREP would be willing to send experts form the head office in Samoa to facilitate the discussions. VESS would be able to host the workshop under the umbrella of this project. It is hoped that guidelines for tourism operators and for tourist for viewing turtles and dugongs will be an output from these discussions. VESS consulted the PCT to ensure that this would be within the scope of the dugongs and seagrass project and was informed that it is.

#### 4.3.3. Press releases / communications activities / publications on internet sites

The press was informed of the launch of the Dugong and Seagrass Conservation Project website via a press release. The VESS Facebook page <a href="https://www.facebook.com/vanuatuconservation">https://www.facebook.com/vanuatuconservation</a> has carried posts of dugong sightings including video of rare footage of a female dugong suckling calf. VESS has also posted photographs of the survey team at work.

The VESS website <a href="http://www.vanuatuconservation.org">http://www.vanuatuconservation.org</a> has been launched and features a page of current projects including the details of the Dugong and Seagrass Conservation Project. The educational materials which were produced with a small grant from the Critical Ecosystem Partnership Fund (CEPF) and will be given out during this project are also available to download from the VESS website.

The Vanuatu Times featured two articles about dugongs and seagrass in March. "Dugong twins from Pango are a real rarity" and "Seagrasses are modest plants of the sea that usually won't receive much attention" by Lise Brix. Christina Shaw was interviewed for the aricles and the Dugong and Seagrass Conservation Project was mentioned in both articles.

So far the there has been a good commitment to the NFC by most of the government departments involved.

However since the election earlier this year the government appears to have been relatively stable.  It is not anticipated that the political situation will affect the project activities. However there may be changes to government departments that may alter the relationships with the project partners.	Low	Continuation of good relationships with government departments and officers.
Environmental risks (severe weather events/ disasters, natural causes negatively affecting project areas, habitats and species)	Port Vila is reportedly the city most at risk of natural disasters. Vanuatu is within the cyclone belt and the pacific rim of fire and therefore susceptible to cyclones, flooding, volcanic eruption, earthquakes and tsunamis. However it is anticipated that although the project activities may be delayed by a natural disaster, they will still be able to be completed at a later date.	Low	Meetings and activities may require rescheduling should a natural disaster occur.
